



Russell G. Johnson

December 27, 1932 - October 13, 2018

The Celebration of Life Open House for Russell G. Johnson of Verndale will be held Tuesday, October 23, from 3:00 until 6:00 p.m. at the Johnson-Schuller Chapel in Wadena.

Russell, age 85, passed away, unexpectedly of natural causes, on October 13, 2018, at his home in rural Verndale, MN.

Russell was born to John Russell and Florence Elizabeth (Grover) Johnson on December 27, 1932 in Ellsworth, WI, and lived the majority of his life in Minnesota. Before graduating high school he joined the US Air Force in 1950 and served during the Korean Conflict until his honorable discharge in 1954.

Russell was united in marriage with Mary F. Harris. They later separated ways.

Russell was a generous, fun-loving man. He, along with their mother, raised their kids to be respectful and hard-working people. He found a livelihood in a warehouse shipping and receiving department. In his time away from work, Russ appreciated and closely observed the outdoors, and especially enjoyed hunting.

Preceding Russ in death were his parents John and Florence; step-mother Winifred (Stockins) Johnson; and sisters Patricia Seng and Lois Eikos.

Russ is survived by his children Robert (Brenda) Johnson of Farmington, Nancy (Eric) Erickson of New Auburn, WI, Diane (James) Greer of Baxter, TN and Debra (Mark Roeser) Johnson of Shakopee, MN; six grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren; sisters Jane (Ralph) Matson and Mary (Eric) Hansen; and many nieces and nephews.

Burial will be in Wing River Union Cemetery, Wing River Township, MN.



“ I am Russ Johnson's 3rd child, Diane.

Here are my appreciations, memories and things I rejoice about having my dad as a father.

First of all, he was an Air Force veteran of the Korean War. I am proud he served for our great country and I greatly appreciate that service.

Next I thank him for teaching me to respect, love and enjoy nature & wildlife. He was always quick to point out ... " there's a deer" or "see that wild asparagus" ...

We children learned of different kinds of trees and birds. He would even tell us which type of cow grazed in the field..."That's a Guernsey - they were bred as a milk cow".

Among other things, I am an avid waterfall "chaser" and I believe it came straight from dad (and mom). My first memory of these beautiful waterway formations was of Minnehaha and later Gooseberry Falls.

We were raised poor to middle class in salary but raised rich in love. We had bikes from tax returns and Christmas brought us one or 2 "big" presents....with the biggest gift of all...learning the art of sharing. Each child got \$5.00 to spend at the "dime store". We were taught how to spend a dollar on each sibling and parent for exchange on Christmas day. It was magical.

Although we weren't rich we had vacations of camping at places like Hay Lake and Father Hennepin. We experienced wolves howling and saw areas where there was an Indian excavation in process. We went on hikes or fishing. I can't tell you how many times dad got my fishing line pulled back out of a tree overhead. I am still amazed to think of the amount of things he managed to fit in a 1967 Chevy wagon. (family of 6, tent, cooler, cots, camp stools, 1 extra friend and even a dog hahaha) I am still a regular camper and even backpack the Appalachia Trail from having these wonders incorporated in my life.

Later we took a big trip across the United States. That gave us kids a great "route 66" life experience of old highways and motor inns. We learned the state capitals and information about the states as we drove. Final destination was Disney Land. Here I learned a lesson for later in life. Appreciate those around you over the park rides. You see, dad would take a movie of the rides to share with others (he was use to us all being there) ... years later I would say "look there goes Debbie" but she was just a passing glance. Now when I'm caught up that way I remember dad and remind myself to stop videoing the ride and enjoy the people of the moment. But credit to him, is he was thinking of sharing with the folks back home that would never make it to Disney. He was definitely a sharing person.

Dad worked for years on the night shift at May Company to support his family. He always came home singing a song. I promise you if any of us kids here a piece of some of his tunes, we instantly think of him.

Although I hated how far he was from his nearest child, I am thankful that dad stayed healthy enough to live and die in the area (and on the property) he loved. He used to visit me before he retired...But once he got retired and moved "up north" he never wanted to leave his home. He would say " I don't have to go anywhere, I'm always on vacation now". It is wonderful that he didnt have a stroke or Alzheimer's disease. No pain or suffering or nursing homes for dad. He lived where he was happy until the end.

If your children's success is a legacy of the parenting you did....then dad (and mom) did well indeed. All of his children are drug-free, own their own homes and have great work ethics.

Good job dad. We are none of us perfect and there is pain and joy in any family. I would even say I struggled with some of your strickness and puzzled over your not being the "card-sending" type. But I believe you were part of what made the best of me.

I pray you soar with the angels....Onward Christian Soldiers. Love You Forever.
