



## Eugene Beyer

December 29, 1927 - December 11, 2010

Gustav Eugene Beyer, 82, of Wadena, MN, passed away peacefully, on December 11, 2010, at Lakewood Care Center in Staples. Eugene was born to Gustav and Valeria (Porter) Beyer on December 29, 1927, and grew up on the family farm in rural Deer Creek. He was in the U.S. Army for two years, serving in the occupation of Japan. Upon return, he met Beatrice Laverne Erickson of Sebeka. They were married on October 22, 1949. He lived in Wadena, and worked at Cuddahay's Meats, Monarch Ice Cream, and Merickel Hardware. Farming was his true passion and in 1972 they purchased a farm eight miles north of Bluffton. That farming career was cut short by an advancing Parkinson's disease in 1985. By 1991 Gene was fully retired and they moved back to Wadena. His hobbies and interests were many and varied. Among them were carpentry, trout fishing, archery, angling, deer hunting, bowling, and taxidermy. His specialty was kindness. Eugene was an active member, Deacon, and custodian at the Congregational Church in Wadena, and a founding member of Blowers Chapel north of Bluffton. In his final years he attended Zion Free Lutheran Church in Wadena. He was a lifetime member of the Wadena VFW, serving in the color guard. Survivors include Beatrice, his loving wife of 61 years; sons Richard (Barbara) of Rosemount, Raymond (Dorothy) of Wadena, Rodney (Brenda) of North Richland, TX, Scott (Jill) of Jamestown, ND, and Darwin (Angie) of Wanamingo; 12 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren; brother Chuck (Ethel) of Wadena; and sister Marie Maatta of Alexandria. Gene was preceded

in death by his parents, one grandson Paul; three sisters; and one brother. Funeral services were held Tuesday, December 14, 2010, at Zion Free Lutheran Church in Wadena, with Jeremy Vance officiating. Military honors were provided by the Elmer Goche Post 3922, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Wadena, Mn. Pallbearers were Larry Olson, Tim Savaloja. Gary Savaloja, Jim Erickson, Greg Erickson, and Joel Erickson. Burial was in the Wadena Cemetery.
