He passed away, at age 84 , on October 25, 2009 at the Elders Home in New York Mills. Melvin attended the Spruce Lawn School that once stood west of Deer Creek. He served in the U.S. Army from 1954 until receiving an honorable discharge in 1956. Melvin was a farmer all of his life, farming with his dad and brothers in partnership, then on his own after the death of his father. Melvin had a real passion for horses and always had to have special ones for show. They were always trimmed and neat in appearance. He threshed and filled silo with a team of horses when the rest of the crew had tractors. He was a man known for his neatness and always had to have everything looking its best. Melvin loved and cherished all his nieces and nephews and always loved family gatherings to be able to see them, visit, and watch them grow up. He always got a sparkle in his eyes whenever they were around. The past three years Melvin made his home at the Elders Home in New York Mills, but his interest was always in his farm, family, and friends. He will be sadly missed. Melvin was preceded in death by his parents; brother Donald; and an infant sister. He is survived by his sisters, Estella Loween of Wadena, Betty (Lawrence) Hanson of Austin, Doris Edholm of Hudson, WI., and Vivian (Ronald) Olson of Clitheral; brother Gerald (Peggy) Porter of Deer Creek; sister-in-law Leona Porter of Deer Creek; numerous nieces and nephews; and his loving dog, Ring, which he cherished with all his love. Funeral services

were held at 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, October 29, 2009 in the Salem United Methodist Church in Deer Creek, with Pastor Mark Bateson officiating. Military honors were provided by the Edward Carlson Post 283, American Legion in Deer Creek. Interment was in Oak Hill Cemetery, along side his parents, in rural Deer Creek.
